2017 STATE LEGISLATIVE UPDATE



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Legislative Update - May 23, 2017

Support:

HB 619 – FOIA Exemption for County Jails (Walsh, D-Joliet/Haine, D-Alton): Supported by the DuPage County Sheriff, the bill amends the Freedom of Information Act to exempt from inspection and copying the following: records requested by a person committed to the Department of Corrections or a county jail, the disclosure of which would result in the risk of harm to any person or the risk of an escape from a jail or correctional institution or facility; records requested by a person in a county jail or committed to the Department of Corrections containing personal information pertaining to the person's victim or the victim's family, including, but not limited to, a victim's home address, home telephone number, work or school address, work telephone number, social security number, or any other identifying information, except as may be relevant to a requester's current or potential case or claim; and law enforcement records of other persons requested by a person committed to the Department of Corrections or a county jail, including, but not limited to, arrest and booking records, mug shots, and crime scene photographs, except for records that may be relevant to the requester's current or potential case or claim.

Status: The bill was adopted by the House by a vote of 98-9-1 and is on the order of third reading in the Senate.

SB 1337 – County Stormwater Management (Rezin, R-Peru): Under the Illinois Counties Code, only 16 counties (including DuPage) currently have the authority to develop stormwater management plans. Many of the remaining 86 counties experience severe flooding as a result of frequent intense rainfall and runoff yet are not authorized to adopt a stormwater plan/ordinance to protect homeowners and businesses. As amended, the legislation extends this authority (permissive) to all remaining counties and permits all counties to make grants to units of local government, non-profits and landowners to assist with stormwater management projects and to participate/help resolve urban drainage issues.

Status: The bill is on the order of third reading in the Senate (deadline for consideration was extended until May 31).

SB 1417 – Electronics Recycling (Althoff, R-McHenry): As amended, creates the Consumer Electronics Recycling Act to improve residential access to electronics recycling. Establishes a number of county collection sites (based on population) that may either be permanent collection sites (five for DuPage) or a series of one-day collection

events effective for program year 2019. The program will collect specified covered electronic devices (CEDs) banned from landfills including computers, monitors, printers, televisions, facsimile machines, electronic keyboards, video game consoles, videocassette recorders, and scanners among other items. Beginning in program year 2019, establishes under the Illinois Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) a manufacturer e-waste program to transport and recycle residential CEDs collected from county program collection sites and sets forth responsibilities for recyclers and collectors. Funds the program through registration fees collected pursuant to the Act that will be deposited into the Solid Waste Management Fund.

Status: Senate Floor Amendment #3 is scheduled for a hearing before the Senate Environment & Conservation Committee on May 23 (deadline for consideration was extended until May 31).

SB 1592 – Consolidation of the DuPage County Election Commission (Harmon, D-Oak Park, Nybo, R-Elmhurst/Conroy, D-Elmhurst): Provides for the consolidation of the DuPage Election Commission with the County Clerk's Office. A DuPage County initiative supported by the DuPage County Election Commission, the legislation allows specified counties to create a board of election commissioners within the office of the county clerk. Sets forth procedures for the adoption of an ordinance by the county board to create this office, for the transfer of records, procurement of supplies, and the hiring of personnel. Establishes a five-member Board of Election Commissioners (2 from each political party with the County Clerk acting as Chairman) and requires the board to hold public meetings in accordance with the Open Meetings Act. Also caps the compensation of election commissioners (see attached fact sheet).

Status: The bill was adopted by the Senate by a vote of 47-0 and is scheduled for a hearing before the House Executive Committee on May 24.

SB 1799 – Processing of Juvenile Offenders (Mulroe, D-Chicago/Gabel, D-Evanston): Provides that a minor alleged to be a delinquent minor taken into temporary custody must be brought before a judicial officer within 48 hours (rather than 40 hours excluding Saturdays, Sundays and court designated holidays). Provides that if an appearance is required of any minor taken and held in a place of custody or confinement operated by the State or any of its political subdivisions, including counties and municipalities, the **chief judge of the circuit may permit by rule for the minor's personal appearance to be made by means of two-way audio-visual communication, including closed circuit television and computerized video conference, in the following proceedings: the initial appearance before a judge; a detention or shelter care hearing; or any status hearing.** Currently, the 18th Judicial Circuit in DuPage County successfully utilizes video conferencing to facilitate weekend hearings for juveniles who are held at the Kane County Regional Detention Facility.

Status: The bill was adopted by the Senate by a vote of 54-0 and is scheduled for a hearing before the House Human Services Committee on May 24.

Oppose:

SB 1451 – Siting of Small Wireless Facilities (Link, D-Waukegan): The legislation severely limits the authority of local governments to regulate the location and installation of small wireless equipment within its jurisdictions. Provides that an authority (a unit of local government with control over rights-of-way) has limited authority to prohibit, regulate, or charge for the collocation of small wireless facilities (the installation, mounting, maintaining, modifying, operating, or replacement of small wireless facilities on or adjacent to a

wireless support structure or utility pole). Directs that small wireless facilities shall be classified as permitted uses and not be subject to zoning review and approval under specified circumstances. Although the bill was adopted by committee, the sponsor has indicated he would continue negotiations to address the many concerns raised by local governments to limit its authority to regulate its own infrastructure and to ensure the safety of our residents.

Status: The bill was adopted by the Senate Telecommunications & Information Technology Committee and is on the order of third reading in the Senate. The deadline for consideration was extended until May 31.

Monitor:

SB 552 – Elimination of Monetary Bail (Trotter, D-Chicago): Senate Amendment #1 filed to this legislation amends the Code of Criminal Procedure to abolish monetary bail except under the Uniform Criminal Extradition Act. **In addition to public safety concerns, DuPage County currently receives an estimated \$3.5 million annually in bond forfeiture proceeds**, monies that are critical to the operation of our criminal justice system.

Status: The bill was adopted by the Senate Criminal Law Committee and is on the order of second reading in the Senate. The deadline for consideration was extended until May 31.

SB 910 – County Board Apportionment Plan (Bush, D-Grayslake/Yingling, D-Round Lake Beach): As introduced, amends the Counties Code to provide that when a county board creates or modifies the apportionment of districts in the county, each district shall also (i) provide racial minorities or language minorities with equal opportunity to participate in the political process and elect candidates of their choice; (ii) provide racial minorities or language minorities who constitute less than a voting-age majority of a district with an opportunity to substantially influence the outcome of an election; and (iii) shall not discriminate against or in favor of any political party or individual. House Amendment #1 filed to the bill also requires to the extent practicable, that districts shall be drawn to create crossover districts, coalition districts, or influence districts.

Status: The bill was adopted by the Senate by a vote of 30-20 and is scheduled for a hearing before the House Executive Committee on May 24.

Other Issues:

- **9-1-1 Wireless Surcharge:** The DuPage County ETSB is the largest county 9-1-1 system in the state and receives it's funding from the .87 cent 9-1-1 wireless surcharge. It is critical that the uniform monthly surcharge continue past the sunset date of July 1 and the mandated consolidation goals included as part of Public Act 99-0006 remain to guarantee sufficient resources statewide and outdated 9-1-1 infrastructure is eliminated, thus ensuring a swift and appropriate response to citizen requests for emergency assistance when dialing 9-1-1.
- **Economic Development for a Growing Economy Tax Credit Act (EDGE):** DuPage County supports a continuation of this tax credit (that officially expired as of April 30) but joins efforts to reform the program to ensure value for taxpayers and provide appropriate incentives to grow, attract, and retain

businesses in DuPage County and the State of Illinois. EDGE is the state's largest economic development tool to recruit companies to our state and to help businesses remain and expand. Since EDGE was established in 1999, it has created 34,000 jobs and retained 46,000 jobs in Illinois.
